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DRAMATURGE By Timothy Jordan Reid

It is hard to imagine a world in which the works of William Shakespeare are not an omnipresent factor in popular culture, but during his life and immediately after his death in 1616 the immortality of the Bard's words was actually far from guaranteed. In a time before mass printing or the internet, plays often existed only in fragments-heavily annotated promptbooks used by stagehands, actors' sides (players did not receive the entirety of the scripts they performed, only the lines they spoke), so called "bad quartos" (unauthorized printed versions of a play often rife with inaccuracies, as they relied on audience members writing down what they heard as the play unfolded), and the memories of those involved. These pieces were all that John Heminges, Henry Condell, and other friends of the Bard had to go off of imagination, Gunderson's The Book of Will is when ensuring that his works would outlive a timeless exploration of what it means to them all, and this is the story of how that be in the presence of greatness, how it feels first compilation of Shakespeare's works, Mr. when that greatness is suddenly snuffed out, William Shakespeare's Comedies, Histories and Tragedies (colloquially known today as "The First Folio") came to be exactly 400 years ago.

Written by Lauren Gunderson, The Book of Will premiered in January 2017 at the Denver Center for the Performing Arts and has been met with critical and audience acclaim alike. The characters presented therein are actual

historical figures who worked with, under, and in the orbit of the greatest playwright in the history of the western world. It is because of them and the First Folio that we have access to The Tempest, The Taming of the Shrew, MacBeth, and about 20 other plays that were never written down in their entirety before the events that you are about to watch unfold. It is believed that a mere 750 first edition copies of the First Folio were printed, of which 235 are known to have survived the ravages of time. In October of 2020, one of these 235 copies was sold at auction for \$10 million, making it the most expensive work of literature ever sold.

We may not know the exact circumstances behind the creation of the First Folio, but through historical sleuthing and a touch of and the lengths that those who are left behind must go to in order to make sure that the greatness is remembered and immortalized

for future generations. Thanks to these men and women, William Shakespeare is today remembered as a legend. For them, however, he was just Will. And this is the story of his book.



In 2012, she and former McNary student, Evan Christopher, founded Keizer Homegrown Theatre.
